
## Welcome message from our Chief Executive


I hope you enjoy reading our Impact Report for 2023, and once again thank you for your continued interest and support.



# Innovation Case Study: Forest Lab

*providing the latest technologies to provide innovative solutions to some of greatest environmental challenges*

## Overview of myForest and Forest Lab

Sylva Foundation launched an innovative new project for myForest users called Forest Lab, in partnership with Forest Research with the aim of improving forest resilience, enhancing forest biodiversity, and protecting nature and the landscape. This exciting initiative uses the latest technology to advance knowledge exchange between landowners and scientists through the collection and sharing of data by volunteer 'stewardship scientists.'



Forest Lab works on a 'plug in and play' model on the existing myForest digital platform, Forest Lab is built on a two-way commitment between myForest users and scientists. This reciprocal arrangement ensures that by agreeing to collect and share inventory data, myForest users benefit from the unique opportunity to learn from their


evidence, as scientists in turn share the latest research and advances in forest management and forestry science.

## Forest Lab impact

With myForest users collaborating with forestry scientists and researchers, there is a unique opportunity to collect and share data that will have an impact, not just on individual private woodlands, but on the resilience of forests right across Britain.



## Future Plans

There are many exciting opportunities with the evolution of Forest Lab. In the long term, there is the possibility of utilising Forest Lab's agility to provide an early warning system to threats to our forests. The short-term focus will be on rolling out specific projects such as Wildfire to ensure both myForest users and scientists benefit from essential research into existing and emerging issues that affect the resiliency of forests across Britain.


# Innovation Case Study: Woodworking and Gender

*Sylva Wood School - innovative ways of bridging the gap between education and industry*

## Overview of Woodworking and Gender Programme

The Woodworking and Gender Programme is an innovative new Sylva initiative. The aim of the programme is to bridge the gap between education and employment for people working in the furniture industry who identify as women or nonbinary, creating a more diverse and skilled industry.


In 2023, the (pilot) first phase of this programme continued with the very first Gender Equality Survey which took place in order to better understand gender equality in the wood-based furniture industry. This was closely followed by an exciting seminar: Woodworking and Gender - 'What's the Story Now? These opportunities to

hear diverse voices and experiences will provide the foundations for the next phase of work to support an inclusive and accessible woodworking sector into the future.

## Woodworking and Gender Equality Survey, 2023

Sylva Foundation launched an online survey to better understand gender equality in the wood-based furniture industry. Over a three-month period, data and information were gathered from employers across the woodworking industry in Britain concerning gender equality. Anecdotal evidence, along with limited existing evidence, indicated significant gender inequality and better information was required.

The 2023 survey was completed on behalf of 28 businesses by respondents who were 56% male. Businesses represented were mainly involved in manufacturing with wood and were furniture makers. In total, 954 employees were represented, with the largest business employing 135 people, the smallest five.

## Seminar: Woodworking and Gender - What's the Story Now?



A unique Woodworking and Gender Seminar was hosted by Sylva Foundation in the autumn of 2023.

More than 70 participants came together at the Sylva Wood Centre for a day of talks, workshops and discussions around gender equality in the woodworking industry. People shared their experiences - both good and bad, connected with

others, exchanged ideas, gave advice, and together developed strategies to support the woodworking sector to become more inclusive and accessible into the future.

As the seminar progressed, a number of themes started to emerge around woodworking and gender. From the importance of woodworking education for all, to building confidence; from the benefits of employing women and non-binary people, to creating an inclusive culture in the workshop - these themes will be key to the next phase of the ambitious new Sylva programme aiming to bridge the gap between education and employment for women and non-binary people working with wood.

### *Future Plans*

This work, along with learnings from our 2022 Summer School, will now provide the foundations for our innovative Woodworking and Gender Programme, with the aims of:

- More women and non-binary people find employment and thrive in the furniture industry, meaning that the inclusivity in the workplace is improved in such ways as to improve retention and development of skilled workers.
- The furniture industry is diversified and upskilled, making better use of a significant proportion of the population which is currently not engaged, limiting innovation and growth at a time when the industry is short of skilled workers.

# Innovation Case Study: PIES project

*PIES - innovative new ways of improving woodland resilience*

## *Overview of PIES*

The PIES project, funded by Defra and Forestry Commission, is delivered via a partnership between three organisations: Sylva Foundation, Forestry Canopy Foundation and Grown in Britain.

PIES is providing a network of independent experts to deliver high quality funded advice to landowners across England, to bring existing woodland back into management or to support woodland creation projects. Farmers and landowners taking part in the project receive funded advice, including a site visit and customised report, plus ongoing online support and technical services via a free account on the myForest platform run by Sylva Foundation.

## *PIES impact*

By the end of 2023, more than 100 landowners have been allocated advisory visits. The area of properties assessed was 5,000ha, with about 150ha of new woodland proposed and 700ha of existing woodland moving towards active management.

We spoke with Derbyshire landowner Phil who wanted to plant some trees on his farm in Derbyshire. His initial idea was to buy some trees (he thought maybe 200) and involve local schools

to help out with planting but he soon realised that he needed more help and was unsure how best to proceed.

Phil successfully applied for the fully funded PIES support. He was then paired with local private woodland agent Charles Robinson which proved to be just what he needed to help him get his project off the ground.

Phil says he was unlikely to have ever invested in receiving the advice which subsequently proved so helpful in progressing his plans. PIES support provided him with important early advice to highlight opportunities and has given him clarity on how his plans could work out financially. Phil is clear that without PIES funding, his 4ha woodland creation scheme with about 8,000 trees would not be going ahead.

## *Future Plans*



Sylva Foundation experienced unprecedented growth in 2023. We are looking forward to working on several exciting new initiatives to support our vision for a society that cares for nature while living with it in harmony.

### We will:

- Continue to build evidence through the British Woodlands Survey, giving a voice to all stakeholders, including research exploring public access to woodlands.
- Develop our approach to stewardship science in Forest Lab.
- Embed research across all of our activities to ensure we can show Sylva's impact throughout our work.
- Focus on the development of myForest suite, providing users with innovative online software, including technical enhancements as well as improved support and guidance.
- Continue building the links between forestry and wood at the Sylva Wood Centre.
- Continue to develop support to promote diversity in the Wood industry
- Develop new business partnerships for our Professional Course.
- Support Sylva's team of people so they continue to develop and thrive.
- Progress the capital development project at the Wood Centre.
